Get ready to vote online in March New Chapter Election Process

As a result of changes to Chapter Guidelines approved in October, election of Chapter officers will now occur in March, with newly elected officers beginning their terms June 1 and serving for one year. New procedures are required since elections will no longer occur during member meetings as they did in the past.

The current and all future Chapter elections will be conducted online. Candidates identified by the Leadership Development Committee (LDC) for elected positions will be placed on the ballot without needing to self-nominate. Current Chapter members who wish to run for office can self-nominate by filling out the form at forms.gle/JbpAbf435VHPtdvk7 prior to February 15. People who know Chapter members who would make good candidates should encourage them to follow the process for self-nomination. Each candidate will be required to provide a brief statement for members to consider when voting.

On or about March 1 each Chapter membership will receive a notice sent to the email address shown in the membership portal on cnps.org at secure2.convio.net/cnps/site/UserLogin. Please log in and check your email address before March 1 to be sure that you receive a ballot. To vote, members should use the link contained in the email announcing the commencement of voting, which will take them to a site listing all candidates for each office along with their statements. Vote for only one candidate for each position: President, Vice President, Past President, Treasurer, Recording Secretary and Chapter Council Delegate. Polls will close on March 15.

Election results will appear in the May-June issue of the Chapter newsletter, the *Blazing Star*.

Memberships lacking a valid email address can request a **paper ballot** by contacting the LDC Chair. Paper ballots

should be returned to the Chapter office and received **no** later than March 15.

Outstanding Volunteer Award: Georgia Stigall

Our Chapter of CNPS is pleased to announce that Georgia Stigall is the recipient of the 2022 Outstanding Volunteer Award. This award is given by the Chapter to a member who has made a significant and sustained contribution to the conservation of native plants and to promoting the Chapter's mission. It is the highest recognition given by the Chapter.

Georgia grew up in San Carlos in a family that loved nature and the outdoors. She was naturally drawn to sciencebased conservation, including habitat restoration volunteer projects, and joined the Chapter in the late 1980s.

Georgia's first volunteer project for CNPS started in 1996 at Edgewood Preserve, with the weed warriors under the leadership of Ken Himes. She was a National Park Service habitat restoration volunteer and crew leader in Yosemite National Park during the summers and volunteered at Edgewood during the other seasons. Georgia was recruited by CNPS Chapter leadership in the late 1990s to serve as Recording Secretary; and went on to serve as Vice President, President (which included being Chapter Council Delegate), Officer at Large and New Member Outreach. She spent over 23 years as a Chapter Board Member, 10 of those as a Chapter Officer. She remains a committee chair to this day, in her role as New Member Outreach.

Georgia has been a regular presence at plant sales, wildflower shows and other Chapter events since the late 1990s. Her professional background guided her in facilitating process changes for our Chapter that significantly streamlined management of these events. She also delighted in volunteering for the Going Native Garden Tour for several years with the late Sally Casey (one of the founders of our Chapter).

In 1996 Georgia fulfilled a lifelong goal of buying acreage in the Santa Cruz Mountains to manage as a nature preserve. Along with her partner, she manages this land to provide for native plants and animals, and to welcome friends of like mind. To this end, she has hosted numerous CNPS board retreats and potlucks.

For many years, Georgia has promoted awareness of habitat relationships between native flora and fauna by teaching, "Native critters need native plants!" As a member of Sequoia Audubon Society, she has fostered communication between our sister organizations.

Anyone who works with Georgia comes away impressed with her attention to detail and process. This skill makes every task go smoothly and it has made the Chapter an effective and efficient organization. Georgia's people skills made her the go-to person for consultation, communication, conflict resolution and problem solving. She exudes warmth and hospitality, and is usually the first to say hello to a new face at meetings.

The Chapter has thrived and grown due to Georgia's efforts. She has recruited many members to the society, who continue to be inspired by her commitment to the environment.

CNPS SCV Nursery at Hidden Villa

The nursery continues to raise funds for the Chapter through sales from its online store at <u>california-native-plant-society-santa-clara-valley-chapter.square.site</u>.

The online store is usually open for browsing, but is only open for ordering during our periodic pop-up sales. Current Chapter members are notified by email before each pop-up sale starts. Each pop-up sale lasts only until all of our pickup slots are filled (typically just two or three days), so make sure that your membership is up-to-date if you would like to receive a notice before each sale.

In addition to plants, the nursery's online store includes Growing Natives Garden Tour and Chapter t-shirts, books, labels and plant signs. Orders can be scheduled for pick up at the nursery or delivered between Belmont and San Jose. Proceeds from plant sales are the major source of funding for Chapter activities and scholarships.

GROWING NATIVES GARDEN TOUR

Garden Volunteers needed

The 2023 Growing Natives Garden Tour is seeking volunteers who are willing to spend a few hours greeting

tour participants and answering questions. This year, our twenty-first, the tour will take place on Saturday, April 1 and Sunday, April 2. The tour hours are 10am to 4pm each day.

As a volunteer you will help to educate garden visitors about the pleasures and benefits of gardening with California native plants. Volunteers also receive a custom designed T-shirt featuring a California native plant. This year's shirt features native oaks. You will also receive monthly invitations for preview visits to a

We ask volunteers to select a minimum of one half day shift at a tour garden, for either 9:45am to 1:15pm or 12:45 to 4:15pm. Knowledge of native plants is not required as we have shifts for both **Greeters** and **Docents**. Greeters welcome visitors to the garden, have them sign in and direct them to various handouts. There will be a pre-tour Orientation in late March with more details. We anticipate about 50 gardens to select from.

Alum Rock Park Restoration

Come help us weed out invasive plants at this natural gem of San Jose. Our habitat restoration efforts allow the native plants to "come to light."

Our workdays take place every Monday and Wednesday, from 8:30am to about noon. Sometimes we have some special extra workdays.

The site lists current vaccination and masking requirements. Volunteer Service Agreement forms must be filled out and are available at the link. All persons under 17 must have a parent signature.

No experience is necessary. All tools and instruction will be provided. Please bring a filled water bottle and snacks; wear closed toe shoes and long pants.

Field Trips

Chapter field trips are free and generally open to the public. They are oriented to conservation, protection and enjoyment of California native plants and wildlife, and we adhere to all rules and guidelines for the lands on which we are visiting. Please bring a face mask in case wearing one is required for COVID-19 safety.

In our region it is very important to be prepared for hiking on rugged and steep terrain, wide temperature ranges and rapidly changing conditions at any time of year. All participants should wear sturdy footwear and carry sufficient water, sun protection, food, clothing layers, personal first aid and other supplies you may need. If you have any questions about your ability to participate in a particular field trip, please contact the trip leader in advance.

Cell service is mainly restricted to cities and major highways. To find your way to an outing, please do not rely solely on your phone.

Sun Jan 1 10am - 2pm New Year's walk to Franklin Point, part of Año Nuevo State Preserve (Hwy 1 coast – southern San Mateo County)

Join other CNPS members as we celebrate a Chapter tradition of welcoming the New Year with a walk to and BYO picnic at Franklin Point, which is part of the Año Nuevo State Preserve on the San Mateo County coast. We will be exploring our surroundings as we casually walk towards Franklin Point, which is the most botanically interesting area of the park.

We will be starting from the North Whitehouse Creek Trailhead which is located south of Pescadero on Highway 1, just north of the Santa Cruz County line.

We'll enjoy ocean views, California native plants and raptors, songbirds and maybe marine mammals. Coastal prairie flora we expect to see includes silver bur ragweed (Ambrosia chamissonis), California goldenbush (Ericameria ericoides), coastal sagewort (Artemisia pycnocephala) and Argentina anserina (Potentilla anserina).

Expected dune flora includes yellow sand verbena (Abronia latifolia), pink sand verbena (Abronia umbellata), seaside heliotrope (Heliotropium curassavicum) and American dunegrass (Eleymus mollis). We also expect to see sea cliff bluff lettuce (Dudleya farinosa) and fleshy jaumea (Jaumea carnosa).

As this is a day to have fun sharing nature at the beach with fellow Chapter members, the end time and depth of botanical or fauna discussion may depend on participants preferences.

Bring binoculars and layers of clothing for variable coastal conditions including wind, sun, precipitation and fog. We will be walking on sand dunes. Bring a lunch or snacks and water or drinks. Extreme bad weather cancels.

Sat Feb 11 10am - 1pm Dirca Walk at Pulgas **Ridge Open Space Preserve (San Mateo County)**

Join Don Thomas for a 3 to 4 mile hike with 500+ feet in elevation change, to search for the elusive Western leatherwood at Pulgas Ridge OSP near Edgewood Road. Western leatherwood (Dirca occidentalis) is a rare paleoendemic plant native only to the San Francisco Bay Area, ranked by CNPS as 1B.2. Dirca is one of our earliest flowering native plants, blooming in mid-to-late winter before most other natives begin blooming in the spring. We will look for lateflowering *Dirca* along the Dusky Woodrat Trail. We may be able to observe other early-blooming plants, such as manzanitas and gooseberries.

Contact Don at donethomasd@gmail.com for more information. Trails are narrow at most parts and may be slippery and steep in some. Wear hiking shoes and we recommend bringing hiking poles. Bring water and snacks for an optional lunch in the picnic area following the walk. Heavy rain cancels.

Sun Feb 26 10am - 4pm Montara Mountain San Pedro Valley Park (Pacifica)

Join co-leaders Ken and Dee Himes on an early spring outing to San Pedro Valley Park. We expect to see some early blooms: Montara manzanita (*Arctostaphylos montaraensis*), pink-flowering currant (*Ribes sanguineum* var. *glutinosum*), fetid adder's tongue (*Scoliopus bigelovii*) and possibly others.

The trip will be a moderate 4- to 5-mile loop hike on the Hazelnut Trail, through coastal scrub and chaparral plus some riparian woodland. Our elevation gain and loss will be about 600 feet and the trip is expected to **last until 4pm**.

We'll meet at 10am sharp in front of the park's Visitor Center. Bring warm and wet weather layers for coastal conditions. Trails may be slippery, so hiking poles are recommended. Bring water and a lunch or snacks, and fluids. Heavy rain cancels. For more information contact Dee Himes at dee4CNPS@gmail.com.
