If you have native plant material from your garden that you would like to share, please bring it along. Be sure to label your contributions for easy browsing – helpful growing tips and photos of the plants in bloom are appreciated. You may find it useful to use <u>Calscape.org</u> for this purpose; there is a link on the plant's information page that allows you to create a printable sign for most native species and cultivars. If you bring cuttings, please ensure they remain cool and moist in a bucket of water. It is not necessary to bring anything if you do not have native material to share, as there is typically an abundance for everyone.

Several well-known native plant books will be available for purchase at the event, including *Wildflowers of California* from CNPS, *Seed Propagation of Native California Plants* (2021 edition) by Dara E. Emery and *California Native Plants for the Garden* by Carol Bornstein, David Fross and Bart O'Brien. Our Wildflower Ambassadors will also be distributing free seed packets and information.

Online Plant Sale

The CNPS SCV Nursery will conduct an online plant sale (california-native-plant-society-santa-clara-valley-chapter.square.site) starting Monday, January 19. You can shop from the comfort of your home, and your plants will be ready for you on Saturday, January 24 at the Seed and Cutting Exchange. The store will close when either the pickup capacity is reached or at the end of the day on January 20, whichever occurs first.

Scheduled pickup from the plant sale will be available at the nursery on Friday, January 23 and during the Seed and Cutting Exchange at the PCC on January 24.

Once you have fetched your new plants, consider trying out the mud planting technique, as outlined by Krzysztof Kozminski here: www.cnps-scv.org/mud-planting. It is a planting method that is effective throughout the year.

Native Plant ID

After a December break for the Holidays, Native Plant ID returns on **Tuesday**, **January 27**.

Bruce Homer-Smith will present an introduction to plants of the redwood forest. Bring samples of redwood forest plants that you are interested in identifying from property where you have permission to collect. The Chapter has 10x hand lenses that we can use to look at small plant parts or bring your own lens. Also bring any reference books that you like to use. We are planning a follow-up field trip at a date to be determined after the class.

At our **Tuesday, February 24** session we will revisit the genus *Arctostaphylos* (manzanitas) and **hopefully schedule a field trip** to look at some *Arctostaphylos* in the field. Any species (preferably not hybrid) *Arctostaphylos* samples will be appreciated for that session.

Over the years our Chapter members have planted *Arctostaphylos* in the Capitancillos Drive Native Plant Demonstration Garden, in Cataldi Park and in Kirk Park, all in San Jose. GROWING NATIVES GARDEN TOUR

Register for the 24th Annual Growing Natives Garden Tour Saturday April 18 (Southern Gardens) and Sunday April 19 (Northern Gardens) 10:00AM to 4:00PM Each Day

Our annual Growing Natives Garden Tour (GNGT) is coming up in April 2026. It is a free, self-guided tour of gardens within our Chapter area that feature a minimum of 70% California native plants. All are welcome but advance registration is required to receive addresses.

These tour gardens are attractive, water-wise and low maintenance. They also use a minimum of chemicals and

provide habitat havens for birds, butterflies and pollinators. California's native plant gardens increase wildlife corridors in fragmented habitats, preserve our natural ecosystem and promote biodiversity in our built environments. They help restore nature, one garden at a time! Native plant tours provide inspiration and information for native gardeners, designers and growers.



Nearly 50 home and public gardens landscaped with California native plants will be open to the public for in-person tours on Saturday, April 18 and Sunday, April 19, from 10:00am to 4:00pm.

Admission to participate in GNGT is free, but registration is required at <u>gngt.org</u> to obtain tour maps with

garden addresses. Register for the tour early to ensure access to late breaking information. Only one person per group needs to register.

Call for GNGT Volunteers on April 18 & 19

The 2026 Growing Natives Garden Tour (GNGT) is seeking volunteers for our 24th annual garden tour, which will take place on **Saturday**, **April 18** (Southern Gardens) and **Sunday**, **April 19** (Northern Gardens). The tour hours are **10:00am to 4:00pm each day**. There will be about 50 gardens on the tour.

As a volunteer you will be part of an event that educates garden visitors about the pleasures and benefits of gardening with California native plants. Volunteers also receive a custom designed T-shirt featuring a California native plant and are invited to attend GNGT garden previews throughout the year.

We ask volunteers to select a minimum of one half-day shift. Knowledge of native plants is not required, as we have shifts for both greeters and docents. There will be a virtual, pre-tour orientation in late March, with more details to be provided to registered volunteers.

SCHOLARSHIPS

Community College Scholarship Program

Our Chapter provides a \$1,500 scholarship for community college students who have a goal of studying or working in a field that includes a focus on native plants such as environmental science, ecology, restoration, park management or horticulture. The scholarship is intended to help with scholastic related expenses such as books and tuition. The application is open to students whose primary residence is in San Mateo or Santa Clara County, or are attending, or have applied to a college in one of these counties. Applicants must have taken a course in California native plants or plan to take one in the next year.

CONSERVATION CORNER

Conservation Committee

Fountain Thistle Work Party Report

On Saturday November 29 we held our fall habitat restoration work party at the Caltrans fountain thistle site. Fountain thistle (*Cirsium fontinale* var. *fontinale*) is a rare and endangered native plant, rated 1B.1, that grows in an unusual habitat, serpentine seeps and serpentine riparian habitat. This is quite different from the typical rocky dry

serpentine habitat. The Caltrans site is on a steep slope along Hwy. 92 where it meets I-280.

Over ten years ago Jake Sigg of the Yerba Buena Chapter and Ken Himes of our Chapter began a collaborative habitat restoration project of the two chapters for fountain thistle. Previously jubatagrass (*Cortaderia jubata*) had taken over the serpentine seeps and had displaced fountain thistle. By coming out twice a year, spring and fall, to remove jubatagrass and other invasive plants, the fountain thistle has recovered.

This fall we had another successful work session. Eleven participants from both chapters removed around 30 jubatagrass small plants and preserved fountain thistle habitat. For more information, contact Donald Thomas at donethomasd@gmail.com.

Alum Rock Park Restoration

Come help us weed non-native, invasive plants at this natural gem of San Jose. Our habitat restoration efforts allow the native plants to "come to light."

Our workdays take place every **Monday and Wednesday** at 8:30 am, and on the second Saturday morning of each month. No experience is necessary. All tools and instruction will be provided. Please bring a filled water bottle, snacks, sunscreen, sunhat and insect repellent if you need it; wear trail/off-trail footwear, long pants and a long-sleeved shirt.

Lake Cunningham Native Garden

The California Native Garden project in Lake Cunningham Regional Park controls invasive plants in a 2-acre area and beautifies it with California native wildflowers, perennials, shrubs and trees.

Workdays take place on **Saturdays from 8:00 to 10:00am**. New volunteers are welcome; City-issued guidelines are followed. The work depends on the season, mainly weeding and mulching year-round, but some planting

Edgewood Restoration

Help restore habitat at Edgewood Park and Natural Preserve, near Redwood City, known for fabulous wildflowers and amazing diversity. Weeders see far more than weeds: they get to be up close to the native plants, some of which are seen **only** by weeders.

Sturdy gloves are recommended; you might also want to bring sunscreen, water, a hat, layered clothing and wear long sleeves/pants.

Cataldi Park Native Garden

Join us to restore habitat in San Jose's Cataldi Park. This project aims to remove invasive plants and restore California native plants in a 1/2-acre area on the western end of Cataldi Park in San Jose.

Volunteer workdays take place on Saturdays from 9:00 to 11:00am. New volunteers are welcome; Cityissued guidelines are followed.

Activities depend on the season. We start planting in late fall after the first rain and continue into the winter months as needed. Spring is the time for controlling weeds and taking care of the young saplings. During the summer and early fall, we irrigate/water the plants, prune established plants and sheet mulch adjacent areas in preparation for planting.

In November, volunteers fixed the fence and pruned shrubs in the native garden. A group of ten students from San Jose State University came to help. Along with other volunteers,

they sheet-mulched areas cleared of weeds (some 1,000 sq. ft.) using two cardboard rolls and wood chips provided by San Jose's Adopt-A-Park program. Volunteers also planted twelve new Arctostaphylos (manzanita) plants.

Kirk Park Native Plant Pollinator Garden

Visit the Kirk Park Native Plant Pollinator Garden in San Jose in just about any season and you will likely find pollinators on the many species of native flowers. While it is almost winter, the Kirk Park garden is still full of life. Dark-eyed juncos hop around among the wildflower seedlings. Blue-bellied lizards skitter through the garden. There are flowers and berries on many plants. And monarch butterflies are still in the garden in all their life phases.

Monarchs in December???

Yes, this is the time of year when monarch butterflies are expected at their overwintering sites along the coast, so

why are they still at Kirk Park at the beginning of December? In years past, our native milkweed would have gone dormant by now, but the warm October and early November weather has kept the milkweed growing. With nice, fresh milkweed leaves, the monarch butterflies seem to be confused and continue to lay eggs, so now we have an abundance of fat monarch caterpillars. The milkweed, which is the only plant monarch caterpillars can eat, is finally going dormant. We are hoping that the caterpillars will be able to find enough to eat so they can pupate.

There is hope for the late chrysalises. On a warm, sunny day last January, two monarch butterflies emerged from their chrysalises while volunteers were tending the garden.

Focus on Manzanitas

Manzanitas are one of the earliest blooming plants in the garden, with the earliest blooming varieties, such as John Dourley, already in full flower. We currently have ten varieties of manzanitas to extend the flowering season, including bigberry, brittleleaf and bishop manzanitas and the garden selections John Dourley, Howard McMinn, Sentinel, Dr. Hurd, Austin Griffiths, Myrtle Wolf and Paradise.


Plant of the Month: Toyon

Toyon is a large, easy-to-grow shrub that has the most beautiful red berries this time of year. The toyon is beloved by only to humans for their bright, holiday color, but also by birds for their abundant berries. With a toyon (Heteromeles arbutifolia) in your garden, you may see flocks of cedar waxwings gorging on the berries. You may even see a waxwing couple passing a berry back and forth until one finally eats it.

In summer, toyons produce an abundance of very fragrant white flowers, which attract an amazing variety of pollinating insects.

Community volunteers regularly care for this native plant garden. We are always happy to have help at the garden! We meet regularly on Saturday mornings from 9:00 to 11:00am, weather permitting, for light maintenance such as weeding, watering; and occasionally we have plants or seeds to plant or mulch to spread. If you would like to help out, please sign up for our Saturday workdays on the CNPS-SCV Meetup page. The garden is located along the north edge of Kirk Park in San Jose. Park along Briarwood Drive near Wawona Drive.

FIELD TRIPS

Chapter field trips are free and generally open to the public. They are oriented to conservation, protection and enjoyment of California native plants and wildlife and we adhere to all rules and guidelines for the lands on which we are visiting.

In our region it is very important to be prepared for hiking on rugged and steep terrain, wide temperature ranges and rapidly changing conditions at any time of year. All participants should wear sturdy footwear and carry sufficient water, sun protection, food, clothing layers, personal first aid and other supplies you may need. If you have any questions about your ability to participate in a particular field trip, please contact the trip leader in advance.

Cell service is mainly restricted to cities and major highways. To find your way to an outing, please do not rely solely on your phone.
