A Short Walk in the Coast Range (Natural History of the Coast Range) A talk by John Muir Laws

Join us for our favorite get-together of the year: the annual potluck dinner and election meeting, followed by a talk by John Muir Laws, which will be our annual **Brenda Butner Memorial Lecture**. The evening is devoted to native plant appreciation, Chapter business, and delectable victuals. It's the party of the year – don't miss it!

Naturalist, educator and artist John (Jack) Muir Laws is in love with the natural world and has lived his life sharing this passion with others. He is trained as a wildlife biologist and is a Research Associate of the California Academy of Sciences. Laws teaches the tools to help people develop as naturalists and stewards and has received several environmental awards for his

work. He has written and illustrated books about art and natural history including *The Laws Guide to Nature Drawing and Journaling* (2016), *The Laws Guide to Drawing Birds* (2012), *The Laws Pocket Guide Set to the San Francisco Bay Area* (2009) and *The Laws Guide to the Sierra Nevada* (2007). He is a regular contributor to Bay Nature magazine with his "Naturalists Notebook" column.

The evening begins at 6pm with our annual potluck. At the 3rd stoplight after crossing El Camino Real (Edith/Main), bear right on to Main St. (not sharp right into Edith). Continue on Main until it crosses Foothill Expy. and turn left immediately on to University Ave. Bear right; the Garden House is 300 feet ahead on the right.


Chapter Guidelines Vote

Our Board has approved an update to our Chapter Guidelines. The General Membership will vote on this update at our annual potluck meeting.

Our Chapter guidelines are like our constitution: the basic rules for how we are organized and how we perform our activities. They were last updated in 2003. Periodic updating is always needed, but it is sufficiently labor intensive that the intent is to make the new version a good fit for five to ten years. The Chapter Board approved a draft version at our October 13 meeting. The guidelines now go to our

members to be voted on at the November 12 General meeting. The main changes are:

- Board selection is more clearly defined, making it simple to determine a quorum
- Board members will be asked to commit to attendance at Board meetings, for more continuity in solving problems
- Dedicated Chapter members who are not committee chairs or officers but wish to contribute as Board members now have a process to become Board members
- Our fiscal year is defined
- Board terms and the budget process are aligned for smoother operations



- A committee conflict resolution process is defined
- Chapter membership rules are clarified for CNPS family memberships
- Guidelines are aligned with the current version of the state CNPS bylaws

Native Plant Nursery at Hidden Villa

Come help propagate plants for our plant sales by volunteering at one of our nursery work sessions, every **Wednesday and Thursday, from 11am to 2pm** (note winter hours). Bring garden gloves, sunhat, clippers, and liquids and your lunch if you like. Other tools will be provided at the nursery. Knowledge of plants is not necessary; your willingness to help is all that's required.

There will be **no workdays** on November 24 and January 2. Starting in January, the schedule will change again. The updated schedule will be available on the Chapter web site (**cnps-scv.org**) after it is finalized.

The next **Monthly Member Sale** days will be on **Wednesdays, November 2 and December 7 from 11am to 2pm**. We are also offering a **new benefit:** members who plan to buy 10 or more plants can make an **appointment** to stop by the nursery to purchase them during a workday (other times also available). 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Due to the overhead in cleaning and sanitizing pots, the nursery **can no longer accept donations of one gallon pots**.

The nursery is **in need of another wire mesh wagon** (similar to the utility cart illustrated here: **thd.co/2dGff1Z**). The wagon does not need to be new and does not need to

have side panels. The nursery can also use medium or small size plastic tubs, similar to those hospitals give out to hold supplies during your stay. You can drop off donations at the nursery during workdays or contact the nursery at nursery@cnps-scv.org to arrange a pickup.

Nursery Grant Challenge Not Yet Met

Maintaining Your Native Garden Year by Year, a talk by Peigi Duvall

Wednesday, November 2, 7-8:30 PM, Los Altos Library, 13 S. San Antonio Road, Los Altos (650) 948-7683

Garden maintenance tasks change as your California native landscape grows and matures. Early on, you'll be getting your plants off to a good start, watering carefully, and pinching for good form. As they develop, you may need to replace short-lived plants, discover just when to divide those that have loved your garden to the point of getting out of bounds, or modify any irrigation layout to serve fullgrown species. As the garden becomes established you may even need to modify your design based on what has failed despite your best efforts or if one specimen is now shading out its neighbors. Learn how to successfully guide your CA native garden from its youth into its ripened natural beauty.

Peigi Duvall is a certified member of the Association of Professional Landscape Designers and a Bay Friendly Qualified Landscaper as well as a member of the California Landscape Contractors Association. She teaches courses through Stanford Continuing Studies on sustainable landscaping with native plants, served as state level Horticulture Program Director for CNPS from 2004-2009 and currently serves on its Horticulture Committee.

How to Propagate Native Plants: Seed & Cutting Exchange, a talk by Deanna Giuliano

One of our most popular events, the seed and cutting exchange arrives just in time to sow seeds and take advantage of the upcoming rains (fingers crossed!). Our speaker will discuss starting native plants from seed and cuttings. After the program, we'll swap plant material. Bring any seeds or cuttings that you'd like to share with others, and containers to carry what you want to bring home.

Deanna Giuliano has nurtured thousands of native plants since taking the reins of the Grassroots Ecology (then Acterra) Native Plant Nursery in 2006, and has overseen the application of new protocols to ensure pathogen-free nursery stock. Deanna has served as president of the Santa Cruz Chapter of CNPS, and remains active in CNPS initiatives such as Rare Plant Treasure Hunts. She previously worked for Central Coast Wilds and the UC Santa Cruz Arboretum.

Pruning Your Native Shrubs and Subshrubs, a hands-on demonstration by Jocelyn Cohen

A native garden looks most pleasing when it has a human touch. Shrubs and trees are at their best with occasional pruning and shaping, and now is the time to do it, before the rains come. During this presentation, you'll learn about the different forms of many native plants and how to bring out their best characteristics – and health – through proper pruning.

Jocelyn Cohen has extensive experience with land restoration, tree care, aesthetic pruning, organic gardening and soil rebuilding. She teaches workshops at the East Bay Regional Parks Botanic Garden. Her business, Poetree Landscapes & Arboriculture, combines tree care and preservation with aesthetic pruning, garden design and landscape restoration.

Creating a Rain Garden for CA Native Plants, a talk by Alan Hackler

We don't know how much rain we will get this season, but we can be prepared for it. Don't let that rain water run off your roof, down your driveway and into the streets, storm drains, and creeks where it may cause flooding. Instead direct it into your garden, allowing it to percolate downward, recharging our local aquifers and purifying the water as it passes through the soil. Learn how rain gardens keep water on site, yet away from buildings, how to construct them, and which California native plants are best suited for them.

Alan Hackler is the owner of Bay Maples, a design-build firm and native plant nursery in the South Bay. His own rain garden has been on the Going Native Garden Tour and he has built many rain gardens for clients. Alan studied permaculture and environmental studies, and is a Build-It Green member with LEED and Graywater accreditations.

Make a Holiday Wreath with CA Native Plants, a demonstration by Sherri Osaka

IN MEMORIAM

James (Jim) Jungo Sugai June 19, 1919 – June 27, 2016

Our Chapter remembers and honors Jim Sugai for many years of service. Some of our memories include:

Jim was always a quietly useful worker at the Chapter nursery. Originally (Spring 1996) he helped install the greenhouse and would come with his truck and mower to clean up around the nursery before our sales. He helped hand water and maintain the plants until volunteers installed the nursery's irrigation system.

Jim was honored in 2011 by Santa Clara County Supervisor Liz Kniss for his years of work in several venues, including more than 25 years at Hakone Gardens and with our Chapter of CNPS. Many of us in CNPS are hiking with the handcrafted bamboo hiking staffs he made.

Jim was a trail maintenance volunteer who salvaged native plants that were in the trails. He would bring them to our Wildflower Show to display, and I was the lucky recipient of two large manroots from Jim at the end of the show. He was always cheerful, always helpful, always active. A great friend of nature and of people.

I was so fortunate to meet Jim and his wife Kik (Kikue) through CNPS in the 1990s, and to enjoy many encounters since at various events, my own home a few times in those early Gardening with Natives years and so on. Jim was the epitome of grace, wisdom, humor at no one's expense, teaching & enriching, and so much more.

One of my first CNPS field trips in the mid-1990s was to Stile Ranch led by Jim Sugai. During a break, Jim pointed

out to me some natural feature I'd asked about, making me feel included and important. In more recent years, Jim and Kik were regular attendees at our newsletter mailing parties, helping to label, seal and stamp our paper newsletters for mailing to members.

Our own Blazing Star newsletters from the mid 1990s mention Jim Sugai as a regular volunteer at Native Hill, trimming back shrubs that were growing into the pathways, and trimming back the California poppies so they would rebloom in the fall. There are several mentions of Jim leading field trips, including to Stile Ranch with Sally Casey in March 1997, with Dick Gehrer in March 2001 and to Gazos Creek with Toni Corelli in May 1997.

The Blazing Star reports in summer 1997 that our "escaped exotics committee" is making progress against German [Cape] Ivy in Rancho San Antonio Open Space Preserve, thanks to the help of Jim Sugai along with three others in recent work sessions.

CHAPTER FIELD TRIPS
